Do not overestimate your capability.

In life, it's important not to misjudge your capacity – whether at work or in life. Raf learned this hard when he committed himself to too many projects. He shared, "I suppose there had been a moment when I wanted to do everything all at the same time. I ended up spreading myself too thinly across all of them, to the point I could hardly finish up work on some."

He advises everyone to find a key focus in life. He suggests, "Multi-tasking is a surprisingly difficult thing to be doing. So whenever I can, I just stick my focus on one or two key areas. You win more when you're focused."

Discover the Power of Learning. For Raf, being technically adept is not enough to be a developer. You have to be open to learning other things too. According to him, "A good developer is a good problem solver, who's not only skilled in solving stuff in front of the computer, but in other areas as well—even seemingly mundane tasks, such as cooking or planning a trip.

Be a great communicator. On the same note, Raf advises other developers to practice good communication. He said that "A great developer must also be a great communicator of ideas! Most developers I know are introverted, but technical skills can only get you so far. Being a good communicator/ presenter/ seller of ideas takes you places."
